FROM PAPER TO IRON NEW EXHIBIT IN 2011



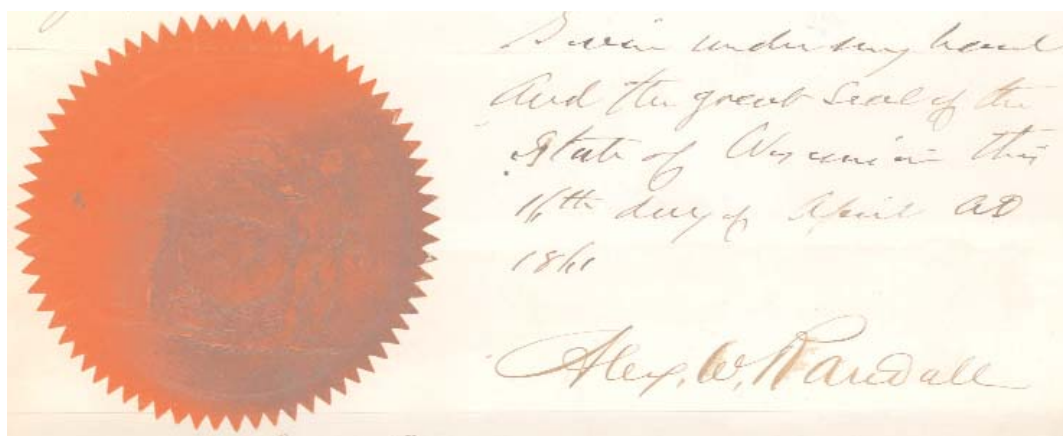

"All good citizens, everywhere, must join in making common cause against a common enemy." -Governor Alexander W. Randall, April 16, 1861

With his signature and the Great Seal of the State of Wisconsin, Governor Alexander Randall, in support of President Abraham Lincoln's proclamation of war against the Confederacy, began the Civil War era in Wisconsin. A relatively recent Museum acquisition, this document heralded the beginning of a four-year journey that saw the state lose 12,216 in battle.

This document is also the starting point for "From Paper to Iron: Wisconsin in the Civil War, 1861-62," a new exhibit that will open on July 2, 2011, 150 years to the day that Wisconsin's first casualty of the war, Private George Drake, died at Falling Waters, Virginia. From Randall's signature – the "paper" – to the formation of the Iron Brigade as the ultimate fighting force, this new exhibit will highlight the story of Wisconsin during the early years of the Civil War when the Union Army suffered numerous setbacks and for a time actually looked as if it could fall to Confederate forces. Focusing on the individual stories of Wisconsin soldiers, this exhibit will highlight numerous never-before-exhibited artifacts while employing the latest in interactive technology.

Utilizing expanded space, visitors will also see a new exhibit on Wisconsin's Civil War battle flags and gain insight relevant to the conservation processes necessary to preserve them. "From Paper to Iron" is the first of three Civil War exhibits planned during the Civil War Sesquicentennial. Educational programs on the Civil War will begin in March – please see the margins for a current schedule – and a sneak preview of the exhibit is tentatively scheduled for May 5, the evening of the Museum's Gala fundraiser featuring noted author Jeff Shaara.



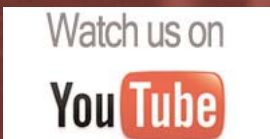

FROM THE COLLECTIONS

SHREDS OF DIGNITY:

CONSERVING OUR BATTLE FLAGS

The Wisconsin Civil War battle flag collection is one of the most notable components of the museum's permanent collection. As a state owned institution, these priceless treasures belong to the citizens of Wisconsin. The collection comprises 180 flags which were carried by Wisconsin regiments throughout the war. Many of the flags were given to the regiments by local communities as a symbol of support and pride. In some cases local ladies sewed the flags by hand, lovingly turning them over to brothers or husbands to carry into war. Other flags show high level professional craftsmanship and elaborate embroidery. Each flag is unique and has a story to tell.

Today many of the flags remain on their fractured staffs, their shattered silk and damaged folds too fragile to view. The only hope for these flags is professional textile conservation which will help stabilize and protect them for future generations.

SHARING THE CIVIL WAR: ONLINE RESOURCES

In the 1990s, WVM debuted its first website. As the internet has grown in complexity and popularity, the museum's website has come a long way. The old site has served us well, but after several years it's time for a new look and a new approach that will offer our site visitors a new online experience that features enhanced educational resources, accessibility, and ease of navigation.

With the 150th Anniversary of the Civil War upon us, WVM will show off many of our treasures, starting with a phenomenal gallery exhibit described in Jeff Kollath's article. Plans to share even more materials through online exhibits, databases, bibliographies, blogs, videos, and more are especially exciting because people all over the state, country, and even the world will be able to access them from their homes. Online exhibits featuring the letters, diaries, photographs, and other materials from the WVM Research Center will inform viewers of all ages about the everyday experiences of Civil War soldiers and delve into some interesting, and seldom explored, topics. For example, how did soldiers in the field get books and what did they read? What kinds of equipment and supplies did Wisconsin regiments require on a regular basis? How did veterans of the Civil War maintain a sense of camaraderie following their service?

Researchers with Wisconsin Civil War soldiers in their family will be able to find information about their ancestors when WVM's well-known Civil War database is put online. Students, from grade school through grad school, will discover rare books to help them write papers about Wisconsin's role in the Civil War through an online bibliography. Blogs and other features will shed light on the role each individual Wisconsin regiment played in the Civil War and how they compared in terms of battles fought and casualties.

Expanding WVM's online resources to such an extent will be dependent on a substantial upgrade to our web presence. Technology has again moved forward, and it is vital for WVM to keep pace. Wisconsin has a proud record in the Civil War through men like Arthur MacArthur and Lucius Fairchild, national symbols like Old Abe the war eagle, and groups like the Iron Brigade.
